1554 Hubbard St. is a two-story frame vernacular residential building. It embodies the historic and architectural qualities of the Springfield neighborhood through its period of construction, its design, its historical associations and its integrity.

Constructed c. 1907, it was originally the residence of W. P. Traphagen.
